I remember she would always refer to uncle Richard as “dick” and it always made me giggle as a little kid.

I remember every year growing up on Christmas and thanksgiving we would spend there and I always remember she made a really good jello mold (it was pink or green I think pistachio I can’t remember) she would always drink a scotch in that short glass with gold rim/gold on it (you know those special glasses that come out for holidays). I remember I use to love that big white carpet in the formal living room that was white and fluffy .. I remember I would rub my feet on it when nobody was looking because it was so soft.

I use to play with her as a kid when she decorated doll houses. She was so good at decorating them, I remember I use to love to play with them and she always let me play with them. I used to love swimming in the pool and then uncle Richard throwing cash in Easter eggs around the pool deck for me to find them, or when uncle Richard use to tease me and say a man lived in his attic called Mr. Teasler, I use to run and cry but Aunt Carol was always there to give me a hug.

I remember she worked at Liz Claiborne , and I remember she always dressed so well and wore really nice silk blouses, with brooches, and a tailored open jacket look with beautiful buttons or a nice Ralph Lauren double breasted jacket. Her clothes were always pristine and tailored. Aunt Carol was a classy lady and I didn’t even

know what that meant as a kid but I did know she was always put together :)

I remember when hurricane Andrew hit I was about 6 years old and my sister was just born. Although I was a little kid I remember this experience like it was yesterday. My parents packed us up and put us in the car off to Uncle Richard and Aunt Carol's house , and I remember that night I was so scared I slept in the bed in between Aunt Carol and Uncle Richard - I remember the bed was dark wood and it was a four poster bed. I remember Aunt Carol making me feel safe.

I remember Uncle Richard had a BB gun or maybe it was a real shot gun I can't remember and he use to tease me as a kid and bring it out and say that there was escape mental patients or there was like someone in the backyard and I would get scared haha and aunt Carol would always says " come on now Dick" .

I had a lot of nice memories with her growing up and most of my youth was spent with her , uncle Richard and Bobbi with my family especially on the holidays. Aunt Carol was a good soul and I really enjoyed her company especially growing up.

I'm so sorry for your loss, but please know I had wonderful experiences with Aunt Carol. I can hear her laugh as I think of her at this moment and I know that although we didn't speak often and drifted apart as I got older and life got in the way I do know she still loved me and would be there for me if I needed her.
